## Third captive active test slated July 26

The third manned flight of Orbiter "Enterprise" atop its 747 carrier aircraft is now scheduled for no earlier than July 26, at the NASA Dryden Flight Research Center, Edwards, California. Takeoff time of the 747/Orbiter is scheduled for 10 a.m. CDT.

Astronauts Fred W. Haise and C. Gordon Fullerton will be at the controls of the Orbiter during this 55-minute captive test flight which is a full dress rehearsal for next month's first free flight of the Orbiter.

If flight and test objectives are successfully accomplished during the July 26 flight, the first free flight will be no earlier than August 12.

This is the second flight for Haise and Fullerton; their first flight was on June 18. Astronauts Joe Engle and Richard Truly were the Orbiter pilots during the captive flight on June 28.

The 747 will carry the Orbiter to a maximum altitude of 7,895 meters (25,905 ft. AGL) at which time the 747 will pushover in a practice run of Orbiter/747 separation.

The Orbiter and 747 crews will perform all of the functions up to

but not including actual separation. After pushing over the 747/Orbiter will descend for a landing at Edwards about 10 minutes later.

The 747/Orbiter combination will make one circuit of the 135 by 39 kilometer (73 by 21 N-mile) racetrack.

The two previous manned captive flights have been rated successful by Donald K. "Deke" Slayton, manager of the Approach and Landing Test. All test objectives were met during both flights.

## More than 8,000 applicants vie for 30-40 astronaut slots

More than 8,000 individuals applied for the 30 to 40 positions opened for Space Shuttle astronaut candidates.

To be eligible, applications had to be postmarked prior to midnight June 30. Many waited until the last day to apply and total application numbers are still being tallied.

The astronaut selection board at JSC is now in the process of narrowing the selection to those best qualified in each category. From these, approximately 150 applicants will be selected for preliminary screening and physicals here.

Thirty to 40 candidates will be accepted for a two-year training and evaluation period at JSC. Pilot and mission specialist candidates will be notified of their selection by December.

The candidates will report for duty in Houston in 1978. Final selection as an astronaut will depend on satisfactory completion of the evaluation period.

The July 15 tally indicates that 8,079 men and women applied for the astronaut program. The mission specialist category had 6,818 applicants and the pilot category had 1,261 applicants.

Women applicants for the two astronaut positions numbered 1,544, more than 19 per cent of the total.

A total of 24,618 inquiries were received after the program was announced a year ago, and of these 20,440 requested and were sent application packets.

Pay for civilian candidates will be based on the federal government's General Schedule for pay scale from grades GS-7 through GS-15, with approximate salaries

from \$11,000 to \$34,000 per year.

Candidates will be compensated based on individual academic achievements and experience. Other benefits include vacation and sick leave and participation in the federal government retirement, group health and life insurance plans.

Military candidates will be assigned to JSC but will remain in active military status for pay, benefits, leave and other military matters.

Currently, 30 persons are available as Space Shuttle crewmen, including 10 scientists. Twenty-seven of them are astronauts assigned to JSC and three hold government positions in Washington, D.C.

Pilot astronauts will control the Shuttle during launch, orbital maneuvers and landings and be re-

sponsible for maintaining vehicle systems.

Mission specialist astronauts will be responsible for the coordination of overall Orbiter operations in the areas of flight planning, consumables usage and other activities affecting payload operations.

At the discretion of the payload sponsor, mission specialists may assist in the management of payload operations, and may, in specific cases, serve as the payload specialists. They will be able to continue in their chosen fields of research and to propose, develop and conduct experiments.

Crews will consist of a commander, a pilot and may include a mission specialist and payload specialists. Payload specialists need not be NASA employees.

## Christmas in July?

Center Operations asks all employees to keep in mind the JSC plans to close down to the extent possible during the Christmas Holiday season.

Four days of annual leave will yield an uninterrupted 10-day holiday period for the individual and also greatly support the energy-saving objective of the closure.

## President proclaims Space Observance

President Jimmy Carter proclaimed the period from July 16 through July 24 as the United States Space Observance.

Mankind has always felt an urge to explore and understand the

world, Carter said.

"In our time, this spirit has led to the exploration of space. From single missions, designed to send satellites into orbit and land men on the Moon, the United States space program has grown into a much broader range of endeavors," he declared.

"Its purpose is not simply to study space, but to understand its relevance to life on Earth. Satellites now orbiting the Earth have helped us forecast weather patterns accurately, discover mineral deposits, detect sources of pollution and establish a global communications network," Carter said.

"International projects such as Apollo-Soyuz have helped bring the people of the world closer together through coordinated research and the cooperative use of land and sea resources."

Carter concluded the proclamation by calling for commemoration of "the achievements of the United States space program which demonstrate that advanced technology devoted to peaceful purposes can lead the way to a better life for people of all nations."


